### What is it?

- The Prime Minister's scholarship supports New Zealander's to study or undertake internships in Asia or Latin America
- Established by cabinet in 2013 (2016 for PMSLA) with specific trade and economic aims however alignment is sought with pillar 3 (Global Citizenship) of the 2018 New Zealand International Education Strategy.
- NZ \$3.75mill in funding available per year
- 2,403 alumni since 2013
- Individual and group programmes group programmes only for Apr 2022 round.



# Cabinet aims and goals

- Strengthen New Zealand's ability to engage with key Asian and Latin American trading partners;
- Improve the international skills of the New Zealand workforce;
- Improve the internationalisation of New Zealand tertiary institutions;
- Increase international understanding of the strength and quality of New Zealand's education system and raise awareness of New Zealand as a preferred education destination;



# **Cabinet aims and goals**

- Establish connections between New Zealand and other countries through participants building lifelong friendships and networks;
- Strengthen New Zealanders' understanding of other cultures and business practices;
- Strengthen New Zealand institutions connections with counterparts in key Asian and Latin American countries.



# Letter of Expectations to ENZ. *Minister Hipkins.*

#### **Te Tiriti obligations**

I expect the Board and ENZ to honour and give practical effect to the Crown's Te Tiriti responsibilities. This means:

2. Partnering with iwi, Māori and Māori providers of education services to transform the understanding of international education and ensure the education system delivers with, and for Māori in the international context.

(d) honours Te Tiriti o Waitangi and supports Māori-Crown relationships.





Strengthening New Zealand's ability to engage with key Asian and Latin American trading partners to support improved living standards and intergenerational prosperity.

#### **BENEFIT FOR NEW ZEALAND**



### **Programme criteria**

- Travel cannot have commenced before award is confirmed
- Minimum of 4 weeks for Latin America and 6 weeks for Asia in country stay.
- All participants of the group must travel and return at the same time and to the same city/town destination.
- Group must only travel to one country destination
- Travel must be undertaken within 12 months of having been awarded the scholarship (i.e. June 2023).
- Groups must consist of 3 participants or more



### **Eligibility**

All members of your group must:

- Be a New Zealand citizen or hold a New Zealand Permanent Resident Visa
- Be an ordinarily resident in New Zealand and have resided in New Zealand for at least 12 of the past 24 months
- Not have been previously awarded a Prime Minister's Group Scholarship (to either Asia or Latin America)
- Medically fit to travel
- Be fully vaccinated against Covid-19
- Be able to attend the full duration of your proposed overseas programme
- Be eligible for an entry Visa into your host nation(s)
- Be at least 18 years old



### Funding

- Tuition fees to undertake a course in Asia or Latin America (not NZ fees)
- Brokerage fees of approved internship providers (for internships only);
- Return economy flights Asia-NZ \$2,500 or Latin America-NZ \$3,500;
- Contribution to living and accommodation costs of \$250 for each week actively on programme in Asia or Latin America;
- Travel and medical insurance;
- Contribution to visa fees up to a maximum of \$200;
- Additional funding of up to \$20,000 per group programme application at the discretion of the selection panel.


Applications for group programmes opened on Monday 21 March 2022 and will close on Monday 2 May 2022.



Programme will raise participants' cultural knowledge about the host culture and has the potential to build meaningful and enduring relationships	Application demonstrates that the selection process will encourage applications from under-represented groups on the PMSA/PMSLA (i.e. Māori and Pasifika, students with disabilities)

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- Applications are assessed against criteria. Selection panel meets in June 2022
- Applicants advised of outcome via email
- Successful applicants complete postacceptance steps, invoice ENZ by 30<sup>th</sup> June. Feedback given to unsuccessful applicants
- Plan and prepare programmes, recruit participants for travel between 1 July 2022 – 30<sup>th</sup> June 2023



## **Application writing tips**

- 1. Understanding the International Education Strategy 2018-2030 for New Zealand and how we are globally connected.
- Explore and understand how the values and aspirations of your participants, and you as a provider, align to that of what the host country and/or host provider can offer. (Never underestimate this key aspect)
- 3. Connect with the host provider early if you are putting a group application in.
- 4. Take a deep dive. Think of the opportunities that exist outside of the education sector. For example, will this add value to your iwi's aspirations in the future? Make these connections and linkages. Think of economic development this opportunity can provide long term.
- 5. Take careful consideration of what is funded, plus the additional project brief design and evaluation support you have to consider. Think of the pastoral care elements (pre, during, and after). Factor these in well
